Students from six schools who participated in the Junk Kouture competition proudly modelled their creations during the morning.

# **Belong To Launch of LGBTQ+ Quality Mark Initiative**



Belong To is launching the LGBTQ+ Quality Mark Initiative 2023/24 with information recently sent to schools. They currently have 57 schools working away on their journey due to achieve the mark in early 2024 and now have places for 80 new schools/centres to take up the initiative.

The LGBTQ+ Quality Mark Initiative as been piloted in over 55 post-primary schools nationwide, with impact assessments carried out by researchers at University of Galway and Dublin City University. This year, they have partnered with over 100 post-primary schools and alternative education centres nationwide to support them in achieving the Belong To LGBTQ+ Quality Mark. As part of the Belong To LGBTQ+ Quality Mark Initiative, they provide whole staff training, one-to-one support, guides, toolkits and other resources.

The Belong To LGBTQ+ Quality Mark Initiative invites participating schools and alternative education centres to:

- Recognise and promote existing supports for your LGBTQ+ community.
- Build on these existing supports and grow as an LGBTQ+ safe and supportive community.

#### **Kinsale Community School**

#### hosts Department of Education EU Conference on Sustainability Education



Kinsale Community School recently hosted a two-day EU Council of Ministries conference in collaboration with the Department of Education aimed at exploring Sustainable Education Strategies. The event brought together educationalists and representatives from 13 different countries, as part of the European Education Area Strategic Framework, to discuss the need for collaboration across educational systems within Europe to address issues relating to sustainability, climate change, and biodiversity.

The keynote speakers at the event included Professor Paul Walsh and Lord David Puttnam. Professor Walsh is a renowned Professor of International Development Studies and the Director of the Centre for Sustainable Development Studies at University College Dublin. Lord Puttnam is an accomplished film producer, renowned educator, and prominent environmentalist.

Professor Paul Walsh shared his expertise on the significance of sustainability education in achieving the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals. He emphasised the role of education in creating a more just, equitable, and sustainable world and stressed the importance of cross-sectoral collaboration in achieving this vision.

Lord Puttnam's address focused on the critical role of education in shaping a sustainable future. He emphasised the importance of schools in preparing students to be critical thinkers and problem solvers, armed with the necessary skills to tackle the complex challenges facing our planet. Lord Puttnam acknowledged the challenges posed by Brexit, COVID, and the war in Ukraine and how these crises have shifted the attention away from sustainability. He commended the student voice for keeping this critical issue at the top of the agenda and encouraged them to continue their campaign for change in our consumerist society.

The conference also included panel discussions with Laura Power, Education Officer for World Wise Global Schools, Liam Wegimont, Executive Director of Global Education Network Europe, and teachers from the school.

#### welcomes Minister for Education Norma Foley









Old Bawn Community School recently welcomed Minister for Education Norma Foley. The visit was the first visit of a Minister for Education in the school's forty-four year history. On arrival, Minister Foley was greeted by student representatives from 1st, 2nd, 5th and 6th year. Head students Sarah Whelan and Oisin Cullivan formally welcomed the Minister and guided her around the school. Students spoke about subjects they liked and their experience in Old Bawn. A selection of students performed a beautiful acapella version of Let it Be led by 6th year student Pearl McCarthy.

Following a chat with the caretaker and secretaries, Ms Foley met with a Student Voice group made up of Robert Ennis (3rd year), Aoife Hegarty (3rd year), Victoria Ikolaba (3rd year), Amy Farrell (5th year) and Kofo Bamidele (6th year). All five students have had very different experiences in Old Bawn, some working with 1:1 devices, others opting to get a device and each student has had their own adversity to overcome with regard to learning. The students were fantastic ambassadors for the school and a real reminder of why we, as a community continue to strive for a holistic education.

Minister Foley then officially opened the Old Bawn DreamSpace. This space has revolutionised Learning and Teaching in the school. A blank canvas, where the students bring the colour with their

ideas and learning, the room is designed so as to allow students to embrace problem solving, critical thinking and collaboration in an ever-evolving space. Students from 2nd year and our DreamSpace Ambassadors from 4th year demonstrated a variety of STEM focused learning experiences through virtual golf, Minecraft, MicroBit, Sphero, Lego wall and Indi cars.

The final stop on the Minister's visit was to have a round table discussion with teachers, Cathal Molloy (Physics, Chemistry and Science Teacher and Year Head), Shannon Power (English Teacher and OneGood School Lead), Charlie O'Callaghan (Science & Maths Teacher) and Regina Grenham (English Teacher and Integr8 Coordinator). The group discussed CPD and focused on the power of in school and contextual upskilling programmes where teachers learn from the perspective of the student, the importance of time to learn and consolidate new skills and the impact technology has had on the learning in Old Bawn Community School.

Throughout the visit, Minister Foley engaged with the entire school community, chatting freely and openly. It was a real honour for the Senior Leadership Team to take a step back and to watch the flourishing school community being recognised by the Minister during her visit.

A personal viewpoint and seal of approval from Athboy Community School student, Conor Muldoon

Hello, my name is Conor Muldoon. I'm a Transition Year student in Athboy Community School and I am the Chair of the Student Council. This is my second time writing an article for the ACCS around Student Voice so I must have done something right the first time round.



As I stated before in my previous article, Student Voice is a key component to the healthy working and running of a school. It leads to a strong relationship between students, staff and school management as students feel they are listened to on issues concerning them, for example learning practices and the running of the school.

From my experience of working on Student Voice with the ACCS and within Athboy Community School I'd have to say it has been quite a successful initiative as we've made quite a substantial change in several areas and continue to do so presently. For example, students in the school have had a say on getting a new PE uniform which has now been fully rolled out across the student population. We got their opinion on what uniform they wanted by rolling out surveys on the uniform and discussions in PE classes about the uniform. We then attended board of management meetings and parent association meetings to gain support for the new uniform which we did and now today we have a new PE uniform that students wear and are happy with. Another element key to the Student Voice's success in Athboy Community School is frequent meetings with the school's board of management. This has really enhanced our Council's incentives as we've seen in the past that the board has held to account the in-school management if one of our projects has been put on the long finger and pushed for our views to be heard and respected. Lastly, another key component to the Student Voice's success has been a frequent meeting with the principal within our school. This gives us the opportunity for our views to be heard and make sure the issues we have brought up are being acted upon. This also shows clear communication with the student body and the day-to-day running of the school.

So, in closing I believe the Student Voice initiative is a successful project. We are currently working on the next step of this project which is the democratic lottery which we hope to have up and running by the start of the new academic year which I believe will be a successful initiative and will further enhance Student Voice within our school. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the ACCS team for the support and guidance on our projects over the last few years. I hope that the Student Voice initiative continues to expand in the future as it has been quite a successful project and long may it continue that way.

The St. Aidan's Community School SPOTLITE Programme stands for: Student Perspectives On Teaching & Learning In The Educational Space. Students and staff have been working on this project collaboratively for the last couple of years and it has been officially rolled out in the school over the past 6 months. In essence it captures and documents examples of highly effective practice in learning and teaching from the student perspective. Students have been visiting classrooms and observing lessons throughout the school. They have been engaging in follow up conversations and Q&A sessions with staff and learners. Participation is completely voluntary and there is no element of inspection or evaluation. It takes its lead from the LAOS 2022 quality standards and seeks to get to the top of Harts Ladder in terms of student participation. Following an initial 3-month pilot process, students presented their findings to a whole staff group in March 2023. One quotation from a staff member following the meeting was: "Thank you, I will change how I teach tomorrow because of what you said today".

Following some publicity surrounding the programme, we were contacted by Professor Laura Lundy from Queens University Belfast, a world leader in Student Voice and on youth participation. She met us to find out more about the programme and said it was an exciting and cutting-edge process that exemplifies among the





highest levels of student participation in schools that she has seen. She also invited the school to present at an upcoming symposium on youth participation in Queen's University in the autumn. We have also been asked to present to a group of school leaders from Singapore on the subject in May 2023.

## All toilets in St. Aidan's Community School are now gender neutral, single person bathrooms

After a major change in design and full retrofit, there are no more communal toilets in St. Aidan's Community School. This was requested by students and has been a huge success. In the almost 3 months since the toilets opened, all traces of the problems that characterised the previous design have disappeared completely. There are no more unsupervised areas or communal hand washing spaces. No more urinals and no cubicles. Instead, every toilet block in the school has been converted into a suite of individual one person at a time bathrooms with all doors leading out on to a supervised corridor area.



Many schools often find it hard to monitor and control what goes on in toilet areas, from vandalism and anti-social behaviour, to use of phones, cameras and vaping. St. Aidan's was no different. This design has totally solved that problem and should be considered by all schools. It is not specifically about providing gender neutral toilets, which it does also, it more importantly makes it easier for schools to ensure safe, hygienic and supervised toilets for all and an end to the many problems to be dealt with due to the former outdated design.

## Castlerea Community School Partnership (& Empowerment of Women)

Women's fearless sacrifices are often overlooked. Thankfully in today's world women participate in every industry, their effort and ideologies have shaped the world as we know it. But what led to this change? What made the male dominant society take notice of the valuable work done by women?

Good evening, my name is Leanne Vaughan, and I am a Transition Year student in Castlerea Community School. In my speech I will explore Partnership and Empowerment of Women inspired by the quotation "The success of every woman should be the inspiration to another". I will examine the fundamental role that women like Rosa Parks, Hannah Sheehy Skeffington and Vicky Phelan played in this revolution and how these effervescent women inspired other women to fight for what they believe in.

The mother of the Civil Rights Movement in America in the 1950s, Rosa Parks dedicated her life to "repairing what is broken in our world" and inspired countless others to put an end to the segregation and discrimination of black people in America. In 1955 she defied the evil Jim Crow law and refused to give up her seat to a white man on a bus. She had enough and she said NO MORE.... In that moment on that bus Rosa Parks inspired a generation of black Americans to sit wherever they wanted on a bus, in a church or restaurant and to enter shops through the front door. Rosa Parks empowered future generations to call out injustices and inequalities and for this we must applaud her.

#### "Until the women of Ireland are free the men will not achieve emancipation".

The powerful words of Hannah Sheehy Skeffington spoken in 1909 in an Ireland that treated women as second-class citizens, which encouraged women to leave all power in the hands of Irish men. Skeffington was an influential figure during the Suffragette Movement, tirelessly campaigning for the equal status of men and women in Ireland, during a period when it was not safe for women to be revolutionary and politically minded.

She did everything in her power to inspire new ways of viewing gender roles, symbolically smashing male rule in Ireland by throwing rocks at the windows in Dublin Castle as women were relentlessly refused entry into political meetings. This action cost Hannah her job her freedom. Her crime – she had enough. She said NO MORE. Like Rosa Parks she was no longer willing to sit back and be excluded, silenced and ignored. Thanks to the trojan work done by men and women in The Irish Suffragette Movement Irish women were finally permitted by law to vote and stand in parliamentary elections in 1918, which opened the door for women to finally have a voice in parliament for the first time in Ireland.

One of my personal heroes is Cervical Cancer Campaigner Vicky Phelan who sadly passed away last November. She was not informed that cervical cancer smear tests results showing her to be "The success of every woman should be the inspiration to another".

in the clear in 2014 were inaccurate and the revised results were intentionally kept from her for three years... an unforgiveable and despicable action that ultimately cost Vicky her life.

When Vicky uncovered the truth about the cover up by Clinical Pathology Laboratories in the US she refused to be silenced. She took the very difficult decision to expose the screening programme to much needed examination. By doing this she was speaking out for me, for you, and for all women. She said NO MORE. She had enough.

When then Health Minister Simon Harris ordered an audit at Cervical Check in 2018 a staggering 162 other women were not informed of missed abnormalities and tragically at that point twenty of these women had already died.

Vicky's final plea to us was chilling "I hope that I have fought enough for your future. It is now your time to take the baton and stand up for yourselves. This fight was for you". Despite facing imminent death Vicky Phelan did everything in her power to shed light on the failings of our healthcare system so that future generations of women would not suffer as she had.

In my speech I have shone a light on the powerful work of many women that have made change possible and inspired future generations of men and women to seek equality and justice. The fearless Rosa Parks, the visionary Hannah Sheehy Skeffington and the extraordinary Vicky Phelan fought tirelessly and relentlessly so that future generations of women would not suffer as they had.

#### What makes these women so remarkable?

Each saw an imperfect world and set about improving it, often overcoming great obstacles along the way. Perhaps we should all be inspired and motivated by the defiant words of Rosa Parks,

"You must never be fearful of what you are doing when it is right".

# Young Social Innovators of the Year Awards 2023

Rosses Community School - Silver Award winners in the Make our World Healthier (Physical Health) Challenge with their entry *Go with the Flow of* your Menstrual Waves

Their team aimed to address the lack of education about the menstrual cycle in Irish schools. They plan to create a module for SPHE/RSE that covers all stages and hormone fluctuations, as well as tracking booklets for girls and information leaflets for parents. The team has worked with various organisations and schools and has conducted surveys and created pilot groups to demonstrate the benefits of tracking menstrual cycles. They hope to get the module rolled out as a mandatory module and to make tracking and information booklets widely available.

# Kinsale Community School - Finalists in the Make our World Safer Challenge category with their entry *Strike out*Spiking

Transition Year students embarked on a bold and impactful project this year, called 'Strike Out Spiking', aimed at raising awareness and tackling the issue of drink spiking within the school community and beyond. The project kicked off with an insightful survey of senior cycle students, aimed at gauging their awareness of the problem. Armed with this data, the students engaged in extensive research, which revealed a shocking reality – drink spiking was being significantly underreported.

Through their research and help from Mary Crilly and Dola Twomey from the Sexual Violence Centre Cork they gained a deeper understanding of the risks and consequences of drink spiking and developed innovative strategies for raising awareness and promoting safety. One standout initiative was the production of a thought-provoking podcast featuring Mary, Dola, Holly Cairns, and Senator Tim Lombard, who shared their perspectives and insights on the legislative measures that could be introduced to prevent spiking.

The students then organised an information night at the school, inviting local hoteliers, bar staff, publicans and senior students to share their experiences and perspectives on the issue. This allowed for a fruitful exchange of ideas and helped to build a stronger, more united front against the incidence of drink spiking. The passion and commitment of the students is evident through their Instagram account, which serves as a testimony to their cause.

They displayed posters about the issue, undertook a food collection in aid of the Cork Sick Poor Society and a guest speaker visit with Age Action Ireland.
